25 Degree Weather ?

Ever have that inner voice that just won't leave you alone?

Today (Friday, Dec. 24, 2022), in this terrible storm, I had an inner prompting to see if a young girl was in her tent not far from us. I bundled up, scrapped the ice off the windows, got in the van, and headed down to the woods where she was living. I walked in about 100 yards and saw the tarps flying everywhere in the wind. As I approached the make-shift tent I called out her name, hoping she was not there but in a shelter. To my dismay, she answered my call.

The snow on the tarp, on the pallets and brush all around the tent-like structure made it difficult for her to make her way out. Going to the van I gave her insulated boots, a pair of gloves, and a hat along with hot chili, a bun, and hot drink. She walked with

shoes half torn and no heels, and her socks were soaked.

The shelter was not open. AJ, my contact for the Niagara Region, informed me that help was off on holidays and the paramedics could not help her to get a place. She said she had a friend to go to; I told her I would be back later, just in case.

Around 6 pm I said to my wife Pam, "Let's go and make sure she went to her friend's place." Again, we went out, scrapped the windows, and drove there. The winds and snow were so



ferocious; I could barely see my neighbour's house across the street. Temperature was -12 C; the wind chill probably made it -25 C. I said to Pam, "I hope she is at her friend's place." When we got there, I bundled up and trekked through the woods with a flashlight; it was very dark. The snow and wind were strong; I almost fell a few times. When I got there, I called out her name as before; to my chagrin, she responded.

When asked if she wanted to go to her friend's place, she said, "Yes, but my belongings are too heavy to carry; I can't walk that far in this weather. My phone has no power to call my friend." I suggested she get her stuff and we would take her. She was so happy. Lugging 4 bags of belongings, she tried to make her way out of the snow-filled tarps. I grabbed two bags to help her, she fell down in the snow with the 2 bags anyway. We both laughed. She came to the truck and got inside to warm up. She shared with Pam and me some of her struggles. We got to her friend's house; I helped carry some of her things to the porch. She told me she would be able to stay here for awhile. Wishing each other a Merry Christmas, she jumped up to reach my neck, giving me a huge hug, saying, "Merry Christmas!"

When we returned home, Pam and I enjoyed a hot chocolate and tea. We listened to some scriptures and had a very peaceful satisfying evening.

I'm grateful that we obeyed that voice that prompted us to go and help this young lady.
